Day by Day Itinerary

Days I-4

Tehran

Depart the USA and arrive next day in Iran's capital, Tehran, a modern metropolis of more than eight million. Dip into Iran's history at the Archaeological Museum, displaying Persian antiquities, art and artifacts from Iran's long past. Admire the Carpet Museum's wonderful collection of hand loomed Persian carpets, kilims and designs Explore UNESCO-listed Gulestan Palace, encompassing several palatial buildings, and the State Jewels Museum, safeguarding the Darya-ye-Nur, the world's largest uncut diamond. Air Arrangements

Stretching between two deserts, the ancient city of Yazd was isolated enough to offer safe haven to Zoroastrians fleeing Arab invaders. Wander UNESCO-listed Dowlat Abad Garden, a classical Persian walled garden, watered by an underground qanat. Visit the Zoroastrian Fire Temple to see its eternal flame, said to have been burning since 470 AD. Make a sunset visit to the Zoroastrian Towers of Silence, where the faithful brought their dead for sky burial. (B, L, D) Moshir Garden Hotel

Days 6-7

Shiraz via Pasargadae

On the drive to Shiraz, take a break to explore UNESCO-listed Pasargadae, founded by Cyrus the Great in the 6th century BC. In Shiraz, visit stunning Nasir-ol-Molk Mosque, an explosion of colors with some of the finest examples of Persian Islamic tilework and stained glasswork in Shiraz. Take a walk around the Vakil Bazaar, an 11th century covered bazaar lined with little shops, courtyards and bath houses. (2B, 2L, 2D) Homa Hotel

Days 8-11

Isfahan via Persepolis

En route to Isfahan, pay a visit to one of the most important sites of the Ancient World - the ceremonial capital of the Achaemenid kings, Persepolis. Darius I (the Great) initiated the building of Persepolis, a huge undertaking of art and architecture, now a UNESCO World Heritage Site. What remains is a forest of marble columns, monumental carvings, and the famous bas-reliefs showing kings, courtiers and gift-bearing representatives of the Persian Empire's tributary nations. Continue to the rock-carved tombs of Naghsh-e Rostam, thought to be the tombs of Darius the Great, Xerxes and Artaxerxes.

Arrive in beautiful Isfahan. Explore one of the world's largest public squares, Maidene Naghsh-e Jahan, also known as Imam Square. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, the square was the symbolic center of the Safavid Empire, and is surrounded by the fabulous Imam Mosque, Sheikh Lotfollah Mosque, the Ali Qapu Palace, and the brilliant Qaisarieh Bazaar. Visit spectacular UNESCO-listed Friday Mosque, its interior displaying more than 800 years of Islamic architectural styles. Browse the Qaisarieh Bazaar, where more than a mile of covered walkway shelters brass and copperware craftsmen, jewelers, miniature painters, rug merchants and throngs of shoppers. Days 11-12

Optional Kashan Extension

Spend some extra time in Iran, driving to and from Tehran to visit the beautiful city of Kashan. Located on the edge of the Dasht-e Kavir salt desert, Kashan gets its water from a system of ganats and from a nearby spring. These provide water for one of Iran's most treasured gardens, Bagh-e Fin, with its centuries-old cypress trees. The classical Persian Bagh-e Fin (also called the Bagh-e Tarikhi) Garden was designed for Shah Abbas I, probably in the late 16th century, and centered around a natural spring. A grid of tiled waterways, bubbling jets and pools supplies water for the cypress trees, flowering plants and orchards that help to make the garden cool and peaceful. This example of a classical Persian Garden was declared, with eight other gardens, a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 2011. (2B, L, D) Airport Hotel TBA
